50-year-old man volunteers in Africa with Corp.

ames Edward Peters, 52, of Waterford Township has been accepted into the Peace Corps. Peters departed for Cape Verde, located off the western coast of Africa, on July 16 to begin pre-service training as a vocational education Peace Corps volunteer. Upon graduation from volunteer training in October,

Peters will be WATERFORD TWP. facilitating

the vocational education of post-secondary students, as well as creating new opportunities for jobs in the building industry.

Peters is the parent of Christel Peters, Suzanne Ryack and Julie Peters, and a graduate of Ogemaw Heights High School in West Branch.

He attended Northern Michigan University in Marquette, where he earned a bachelor's degree in industrial technology, graduating in 1978. Peters previously worked as a senior industrial engineer for one of the largest automotive companies in the world, designing and implementing operator work stations on assembly lines in North America. He also is a licensed builder in Michigan.

"After working 28 years, it's just time to give back," Peters said. "I want to share my experience and knowledge and hopefully make a difference in others' lives. What an absolute privilege it is to serve my country, and I hope I can

make the country proud."

Today, 8,079 Americans serve in the Peace Corps, with 5 percent of currently serving volunteers age 50 or older. The Peace Corps regards older volunteers as a great asset, bringing both their professional and life experiences to help countries around the world meet their development needs.

During the first three months of his service, Peters will live with a host family in Cape Verde to become fully immersed in the country's language and culture. After acquiring the language and cultural skills necessary to assist his community, Peters will serve for two years in Cape Verde, living in a manner similar to people in his host country.

Peters joins the 344 Michigan residents currently serving in the Peace Corps. More than 6,103 Michigan residents have served in the Peace Corps since 1961.

Since the program's establishment in 1988, more than 416 Peace Corps Volunteers have served in Cape Verde. A nation of 10 islands located off the western coast of Africa, Cape Verde has nine inhabitable islands. There are 56 volunteers working on eight of these islands in the areas of education. community and youth development, and information technology today. The Peace Corps also is considered a major player in the nation's program to combat the HIV/AIDS epidemic, and


